Vera Rubin, Dark Matter GOAT

Vera Rubin was the GOAT of dark matter. Move over Stephen Hawking (with all due respect), make way for Vera Rubin. She discovered dark matter by observing that stars in spiral galaxies rotate at unexpectedly high speeds, even at the outer edges, indicating the presence of unseen mass. This observation, along with data from other galaxies, led her to conclude that galaxies contain far more mass than what is visible, which she termed "dark matter."

Pollinator Power

If you enjoy stopping to smell the flowers or eating fruits and vegetables, you can thank a pollinator.

What is a pollinator? A pollinator is something that can spread pollen from part of a flower to another resulting in fertilization of the plant. Most people think of insects but there are many types of pollinators. They come in a variety of forms, living and non-living. In honor of our upcoming Pollinator Bioblitz and our recently completed Pollinator Census of the Southeast, we'll introduce you to a few pollinators at work.



Insects come to mind first when people are asked to name a pollinator. A few of our common pollinators in Georgia are bees, wasps, flies, beetles, butterflies, and moths. Non-insect invertebrates can help pollinate too. Snails and slugs can help pollinate flowers that are close to the ground like the little brown jugs and wild ginger.

Hummingbirds are great pollinators. Their long slender beak can fit in the tubular shaped flowers. Pollen collects on their beak and feathers. Here in Georgia, the Ruby Throated Hummingbird is our main resident during the spring and summer

months. At the nature center, when the red buckeye starts to bloom, it is time for the hummingbirds to arrive.

In other parts of the United States and the world, there are many other animals like bats, opossums, lemons, and geckos that can help pollinate plants. About 1500 species of non-insect pollinators have been observed.

Finally, our non-living pollinators such as wind and water contribute to plant pollination. In the spring, we often notice everything turning yellow. It is a familiar sight to those living in heavy pine areas. When the wind blows, you can see it floating through the air and coating everything it

passes in yellow dust. Water as a pollinator is much rarer and is called hydrophily. Water carries pollen on the surface to particular plants. Some spread pollen through underwater currents. Unfortunately, here in Georgia these plants tend to be invasive species like *Hydrilla*.



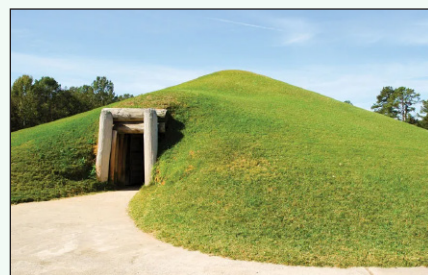

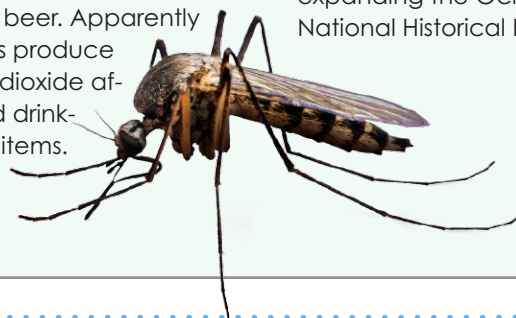
Mosquitoes

Mosquitoes will still be active in the fall. Want ways to deter mosquitoes? Avoid wearing orange and red and make sure to wear loose fitting clothes. Using repellent can be helpful, but apply in a sweeping motion all over you. Mosquitoes tend to be crepuscular when biting, so avoid dawn and dusk. Make sure to not have standing water around outside. These insects don't even need a full cup of water to breed. Finally, watch your consumption of bananas and beer. Apparently human bodies produce more carbon dioxide after eating and drinking these two items.

Trail Volunteers are Terrific

For many years, our TrailKeepers have helped to maintain our trails at the nature center. They have walked, weeded, cut, kept up the pathways, and reported any major problems to the staff as needed. Trail Ambassadors, the volunteer trail service group managed by the Trails & Open Space staff, is now taking over the responsibilities to maintain the nature center trails. Our staff will still keep an eye on things but these volunteers, led by Allison Popchuck (pictured above), will care for the trails on a regular basis.



are expected to put in four hours of service per month and can work individually or as part of a trail team. You aren't limited to nature center trails but can also volunteer at Sandy Creek Park, Southeast Clarke Park, Walker Park, along the Greenway—just about anywhere we have trails in Athens-Clarke County. Over 100 volunteers are now assisting on more than 50 miles of trails.

Volunteers make a huge difference on our park properties. They construct new trails, rehabilitate older ones, and provide much needed help after storms and other incidents. Each Trail Ambassador is issued a daypack and a vest that helps them perform their duties and

serve as a friendly representative to our community. From helping a hiker, biker, or runner find their way to improving habitat for wildlife, these volunteers let us continue to make our parks the best places they can be for our community.

Please consider becoming a Trail Ambassador where you can play an important part in protecting and providing resources for our community while enjoying the outdoors.

There are over four miles of trails at the nature center along with the greenway trail system that need ongoing attention to keep them clear, safe, and fun to use. INVASIVE PLANT MANAGEMENT

Interested in invasive plant control and habitat restoration from the back yard to the back woods? Middle Oconee Parks, Leisure Services' newest cost center, has partnered with the ACC Department of Sustainability to offer an invasive plant management workshop called Bring Back Your Back Yard: Invasive Removal 101. Join us to learn more about Athens' most unwanted yard guests and how you can safely and effectively evict them. We will discuss what an invasive species is, why they aren't the best yard plants, and how to identify some of the most common invasives in Athens. Then we will offer up some practical ways to treat and remove

them from your yard. People who complete this training will be eligible to join ACC Forest Friends. This group of volunteers will assist the Department of Sustainability with wildlife habitat restoration projects across Clarke County. Several of these locations are protected green spaces currently closed to the public.

THINGS

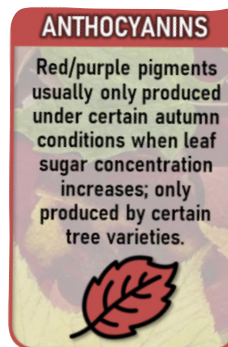
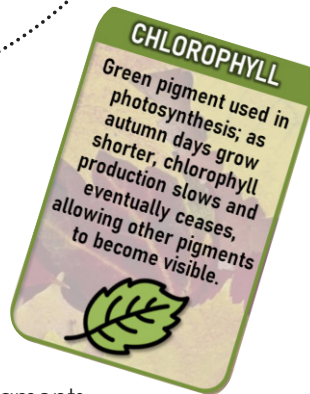

Why Leaves Change Colors in the Fall

1. **Chlorophyll** production slows down
 2. Days get shorter
 3. Temperatures decrease
 3. Veins in the leaves close off, trapping pigments
- Warm, sunny days and cool nights generally produce the most vibrant displays. The tree sheds its leaves to conserve energy and water during the winter, a process called **abscission**.
