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Introduction

The United States Department of Justice (DOJ), pursuant to the National Standards to Prevent, Detect, and Respond to Prison Rape Under the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) 28 C.F.R. Part 115 requires our agency to collect a defined set of data for every allegation of sexual abuse. Through what will be referred to in this report as “standards”, PREA further requires the Department of Corrections to aggregate and review that data in order to assess and improve our effectiveness as an agency at preventing, detecting and responding to PREA. Standards related to the collection of data include §115.87 Data Collection; §115.88 Data Review for Corrective Action; and §115.89 Data Storage, Publication, and Destruction. For reference purposes, they are included within this report.

Trends

The global pandemic has continued to impact operations with a lower than average daily population (based on the past several years) and reduced work and programs activities for the returning citizens. No trends are visible from this year's allegations, and the trends of retaliatory allegations does not appear present in 2020. All allegations are thoroughly investigated and officer misconduct is handled by policy. Returning citizens continue to appear to use the PREA hotline, not to report PREA incidents or allegations, but rather to hold or reserve the housing unit phones while waiting to make other personal calls. Frequently, calls to the PREA hotline are made, but no formal report and no link to a specific returning citizen is available.

All collected data is submitted to the Georgia Department of Corrections (GDC) to be included on their annual responses to the Bureau of Justice Statistics' (BJS) Survey of Sexual Violence (SSV).

Identified Problem Areas and Corrective Action

PREA standards require a review of collected data in order to identify problem areas and establish plans of corrective action. Based upon statistical data alone, there are no obvious problem areas that are not already being addressed through our efforts to achieve compliance with PREA standards. This includes improved returning citizen education, data collection, and some modifications to the current building layout. Improvements to the camera systems are ongoing.

To continue effective data collection, the department will include all allegations, including any use of the PREA hotline, such as those phone calls which are immediately known to be made in bad-faith by the returning citizens. However, if the call to the PREA hotline is disconnected early in the call duration, the ability to connect the call to a returning citizen may not be possible. Annual reports, such as this document, will be prepared and posted on the Athens-Clarke County Department of Corrections website.

During their classification, returning citizens are questioned about their familiarity with PREA to include their awareness of their access to Victim's Advocacy services. That information is made consistently available in every returning citizen housing unit.

Regarding facility layout, the department has not made any modifications in 2021. However, a request for quotes to upgrade the camera system in the Diversion/Transition Center was received with a potential 2022 upgrade.

Corrective Actions

2019

Two additional cameras were installed in security areas. One camera is located in the Prison Kitchen, where meals are issued directly to offenders in the chow hall. The second camera is located in the lobby of the administrative segregation/isolation unit.

Barriers were improved in the three dormitories in the Corrections Institution restroom areas. All three shower areas have raised barriers to better obstruct the view from the common areas, the Control Room, and the security cameras. A-dorm and C-dorm also have barriers between select commodes to obscure the views of the cameras, and increase offender privacy while using these facilities.

2020

The Diversion/Transition Center installed new partitions in the intake/shakedown area. These partitions replace the curtains that previously hung from the ceiling to approximately one foot above the floor. The curtains completely obstructed any view of the officer-conducted strip search of work release participants returning from any outing. The new partitions consist of solid walls from the floor and are approximately 60 inches in height. The layout prevents view of the strip search process while allowing enough visibility to prevent the issue of a single staff person occupying a limited space with a single offender (1:1 ratio).

2021

The department has received quotes to improve the camera systems in the Corrections Institution with updated software, and to overhaul the Diversion/Transition Center's camera system with a 100% increase in cameras throughout the facility to include staff areas and programs hallways. An installation date in 2022 is projected.

Assessment of the ACC DOC Progress in Addressing Offender Sexual Abuse

This department is fully committed to effectively preventing, detecting, and responding to Prison Rape as enforced by the Prison Rape Elimination Act. The Warden has designated the Superintendent as the department's PREA Coordinator.* This role will routinely work with the other designated members of the Sexual Abuse Response Team (SART) to enforce the department's zero-tolerance policy towards the sexual harassment, abuse, and assault of offenders.

It is the intention of this department to fully meet all PREA standards, and to demonstrate this compliance with required Federal audits. Improvements and assessments will be reported on future annual reports to be posted on the department's website.

*In relation to the Georgia Department of Corrections (GDC), the Athens-Clarke County Department of Corrections' PREA Coordinator will be recognized as the site's PREA Compliance Manager reporting to the GDC PREA Coordinator.
