School: Cleveland Road Elementary

Art Teacher: Jen Rivers

Teacher Statement: **REImagine Bugs!** The students were challenged to create a collage of a bug, using the elements of art, shape and color. Bugs have a reputation of being gross or scary. The students had to select a bug and reimagine its appearance to see if it could cause a different reaction. The students used their knowledge of geometric and freeform shapes to assemble their bug collage.

Media: Colored paper collage

Teacher statement: Amy's bug really embodies the challenge. She chose a very hated bug and used color to transform it to appear fun and happy.

Student Statement: What I made was a cockroach. I tried to turn it from something people consider scary, to a very happy and colorful piece of art. I glued pieces of colorful paper to make my collage pop!

By answering the question, "What can this item become?", students were able to discover new ways to transform commonly discarded items into works of art. The students were encouraged to see that art is everywhere, especially in places they had never realized before.

Title: Bob the Master

Grade: 4

Media: Mixed media

Teacher Statement: Cristian has worked so hard as he repurposed various materials to create his character sculpture. He put in many hours both in art class and during recess time to complete his sculpture. His creativity, construction concepts, and work ethic are quite impressive!

Student Statement: I made Bob the robot. I used cardboard, cups, paper towel rolls, a food container, oatmeal containers, pipe cleaners, foam paper, paper clips, fuzzy pom-poms, aluminum foil, knives,

forks, and spoons. First I cut out pieces of cardboard for the body and hot glued them together. I glued many cups together for the arms. I made a cane attached to the arm made of paper towel rolls. I used two oatmeal containers for the legs. I wrapped the body with aluminum foil and added different features for the face. I added a monocle to his eye. I got a big piece of cardboard for the base and glued Bob to it. This piece is special because it was a figure in my mind for many years and it helped me imagine stuff in my head when I was bored.

Media: Mixed media

Teacher Statement: Caleb did an amazing job repurposing a cereal box, cups, and plastic container into a lion!

Student Statement: I made a lion out of a cereal box, a plastic container, tissue paper, toilet paper tubes, pipe cleaners, cups, bottle caps, and paper. I first painted the cereal box yellow. Then I added the legs (the 2 toilet paper tubes and clear cups) and painted them yellow. I used a hot glue gun to add a plastic container as the lion's head and painted it yellow. I added two soda caps at the top and painted them yellow. I twisted the pipe cleaners together and glued orange tissue paper to one of the ends for the tail and glued the other end to the body. I added tissue paper behind the ears. I added a pipe cleaner for the mouth. I made a triangle out of paper and painted it pink for the nose. Then I painted two soda cups black and added it to the face for the eyes. This art is special to me because it is based off my stuffed lion, Leo. Also it reminds me of my cat, Tigres.
